

Introduction from the Chair of Governors

I am pleased to be given the opportunity as Chair of Governors to present the Annual Report to parents.

The 'Schools Standards and Organisation Act 2013' has removed the requirement for School Governing Bodies to hold an Annual Meeting with parents. However, new arrangements mean that you have the right to request up to 3 meetings with the Governing Body in any school year. For this to take place, the following 4 conditions need to be met:

- Parents will need to raise a petition in support of holding a meeting.
- The meeting must be called to discuss matters which affect the school. It is not designed to discuss individual matters. The petition should include brief details of the matter to be discussed and the reasons for calling the meeting.
- Parents can use this right to request up to 3 meetings with a school Governing Body during the school year.
- There must be at least 25 school days left in the year when the petition is received in order that the meeting can be held. A 'school day' means a day when the school is open to pupils and does not include weekends, public or school holidays or INSET days.

School Improvement Plan

Introduction

- We believe that people are our greatest asset and that we are creating an excellent school for our students, staff and community.
- We are committed to high quality learning experiences that challenge, engage and support every student.
- We work towards the highest standards and outcomes, lifting students to higher levels than they had considered possible.
- This school improvement plan has been developed through consultation with students, staff, parents and governors.

What do we need to address?

- 1. <u>Learning what students can do.</u> We target the:
 - outcomes for the students of years 11 and 13 to be in the top 25% of similar schools;
 - outcomes for the most able 20% of each year group; and
 - closure of gaps in performance between vulnerable groups and those not in such a group.
- 2. Wellbeing and attitudes to learning what students can do. We target the:
 - recovery of attendance to excellent levels;
 - development of aspirational learners; and
 - development of personal emotional health strategies and confidence.
- 3. Teaching and learning experiences what we provide for students. We target the:
 - provision of learning experiences that immerse, challenge and develop personal responsibility in order that all students engage with school and attain well;
 - introduction of Curriculum for Wales, including a new Health and wellbeing curriculum, in Year 7, 8 and 9;
 - introduction of an assessment model for Curriculum for Wales;
 - opportunities for students to improve the literacy skills of students, in particular writing;
 - further develop whole school bilingualism; and
 - review of learning experiences to stimulate and challenge ALN pupils and support them to make the best possible progress.
- 4. Care, support and guidance what we provide for students. We target the:
 - construction of the school wellbeing provision to deliver identified needs;
 - provision of a universal offer for emotional health support for students;
 - development of wider participation in pupil voice groups and opportunities to support school improvement;
 - revision of the PSE learning opportunities for students; and
 - refinement of electronic safeguarding procedures to enable the monitoring of patterns of concerns.
- 5. Leadership and management what we do to make the school excellent. We target the:
 - further improvement of communication and engagement between school and parents or carers; and
 - establishment of the new staff leadership structures; and
 - enhance resources for learning and wellbeing.

Prospectus

All pupils in year 7 and 10 who are on the ALN register (not statemented pupils) have had an Individual Development Plan meeting in preparation for the ALNET that goes live in January 2022. This is a three-year rolling program set by the Welsh Assembly Government and other year groups will follow. This paperwork replaces the Individual Educational Plan for year groups 7 and 10 only until September 2022 when the next two year groups will move to the new system.

The Learning & Wellbeing department

The Learning & Wellbeing department provides support and intervention for any students who are identified as needing support in order to fulfil their potential. Pastoral support is provided by the teams of ALN, wellbeing and progress leads. Outside agency support is also coordinated through the Learning and Wellbeing staff. Important examples include: counsellors, educational psychologist, links with families first, and FACT.

There is a range of extra-curricular provision including tutoring, breakfast nurture club, ALN parent support sessions, MOD after school club, homework club and leadership courses.

School Achievements

Through a combination of the Headteacher's Report to the Governing Body, three yearly newsletters to parents, three yearly letters by the Headteacher, communication via the school website and twitter, all the major achievements of the school have been identified and recognized.

Action taken to Review School Policies

Policies and Procedures are updated annually and are available to the relevant parties on the school website.

School Links with the Community

The School offers a comprehensive range of activities, both curricular and extra-curricular. Extra-curricular opportunities are available in music, drama and sport in particular with community clubs working alongside the school to enhance or link provision such as Llantwit Major Rugby club.

The school works in partnership with key stakeholders to apply for grants and raise money to support school projects. Various local church groups enrich many of our daily acts of collective worship and assemblies.

A wide cross-section of local clubs and businesses have contributed to the school's Community work including The Principality building society, Keep Wales Tidy, Llantwit Major town council, Vale of Glamorgan council and Cardiff Wales airport and have now become key pillars in the school's delivery of the Welsh Baccalaureate. The school also supports a number of local organisations with the pupils running a variety of events including a senior citizens Christmas support where form groups create and present hampers.

The School has also maintained and fully utilised its excellent links with Careers Wales and MCPT College to continue to provide a diverse range of courses and educational Guidance to pupils in all Key Stages. The MPCT also run leadership and team building courses and support our provision for MOD pupils.

The school has an extensive transition programme covering Years 4, 5 and 6. There is a close link with the Youth service who work alongside the school to provide additional support for learners who may find transition more challenging.

The work of the Parent Forum has given a significant boost to the school's engagement with this important stakeholder group. They have also worked closely with the governors and pupil council to input into the school improvement plan. The PTA continue provide valuable funding through a range of engaging events.

The school runs a comprehensive programme of educational trips within the stipulations of provision for good public health during the Covid-19 pandemic.

Sporting Opportunities

The school has an extensive range of sporting and extra-curricular activities for pupils to enjoy. This is supplemented by the 5x60 programme.

Welsh Language Provision

Formal Welsh provision in the school is provided at KS3, KS4 and KS5. At GCSE, all pupils study Welsh as a second language. Beyond lessons the school promotes the use of the Welsh language reflecting the Welsh Government document 'Our Language: Its Future, laith Pawb'.
